Moorhead Police Reinvesting in Community Oriented Policing Efforts


The Moorhead Police Department is returning to its community-oriented policing roots. Renewed efforts are underway to bring officers closer to the public to form partnerships in order to solve neighborhood problems. As Moorhead grows, the demands for police services are also growing. In examining crime and call statistics, there have been a number of repeat calls, indicating there has not been a meaningful impact on the root causes of the problems.

Staffing challenges in recent years have caused our Police Department to become reactive to the increasing call load, however, the department is returning to a personal approach where neighborhoods get to know their beat officers. This will build trust, identify problems, and encourage partnerships. Working together, the Department and community members will tackle issues and improve the livability and quality of life in our Moorhead neighborhoods.

The Police Department Mission Statement serves to orient the delivery of police services:

Our mission is to maintain peace and order through the provision of police services that are of the highest quality and responsive to the needs of the community. We will contribute to the safety and security of the community by apprehending those who commit criminal acts, by developing partnerships to prevent, reduce or eliminate neighborhood problems, and by providing police services that are fair, unbiased, judicious, and respectful of the dignity of all individuals.





In 2019, changes were made within the department to re-focus on Community Policing. A mid-level management position (lieutenant) was split to allow for two entry-level patrol officer positions to immediately bolster staffing with nominal budget impact. The patrol division that was led by three lieutenants, one per shift on each of three shifts, was reduced to one lieutenant to streamline command. Each of the three patrol shifts are supervised by two sergeants in this 24/7/365 operation.

Moorhead is currently divided into four patrol beats. Each shift must have a minimum staffing of four officers, led by a sergeant, to cover each beat. Since each neighborhood fits within a beat, police staff will get to know business owners/managers, landlords, block clubs, and the citizens that reside in that area. The Police Department strives to work as partners to identify neighborhood problems and reduce calls for service, especially repeat calls, through prevention and focused enforcement or by bringing in other resources from investigations or partner agencies within the City or County.

The Police Department has monthly staff meetings in which the patrol lieutenant provides an overview of call statistics per beat and

identifies trends. Beat sergeants present initiatives to their officers to build relationships and respond to trending crimes or problems. They also discuss results or impact of these efforts and plan for necessary adjustments. It is the City's goal to reduce crime through prevention, identify issues that affect the quality of life in our neighborhoods, and work together for a better Moorhead.

Moorhead's Opportunity Zone

The 2017 Tax Cut and Jobs Act created a new program to direct investment into historically disadvantaged communities and neighborhoods known as Opportunity Zones. The program provides tax benefits for holders of capital gains if they invest their returns in new projects in these zones.

Moorhead Fire Department Update

Our Fire Department responded to 3,810 calls for service in 2018, averaging over 10 calls for service each day. Of those calls, 64.8% were related to medical and rescue, the remaining 35.2% were related to fires, hazardous materials, and other incidents. This was a seven percent increase in call volume from 2017.



responds to fires, fire alarms, vehicle accidents, and hazardous condition calls. The 2006 model will serve as a backup response pumper for the next ten years.

The total value of property involved in fire-related calls in 2018 totaled \$9.08 million. Fire damage was estimated at \$1.34 million resulting in an 85% save rate.

The Insurance Services Office (ISO) recently conducted an analysis of Moorhead's fire protection capability and reaffirmed ISO Class 3 rating (lower numbers on a 1 to 10 scale are better). This places the Moorhead Fire Department in a better rating bracket than 88% of fire departments in the United States, and generally translates into lower fire insurance rates for homes and businesses (2017 ISO statistics).

The City of Moorhead also recently purchased a new Rescue Pumper which replaces a 2006 model. The new rescue pumper will serve as "Engine #1" and will housed at Station One located on 1 Avenue and 12 Street North. Engine #1

Update on Center Avenue Improvements

Water main replacement on Center Avenue from the River to 8 Street and Center Avenue bridge repair will be completed this summer. Additional street improvements were planned and bid, but the single bid received for the street improvements was approximately \$800,000 (37%) higher than the engineer's cost estimate. The bid was formally rejected to allow a revision of the plans that may result in more competitive bids in line with the project budget.

In the short-term while the bridge and water main project are underway, the City of Moorhead is moving forward with some of the low-cost items that were part of the original project, including:

- Tree removal north of US Bank and straightening of curb and street (complete)
- Tree removal, sign relocation, and modification of a planter to achieve sight distance at 7 St
- Pavement repair following water main replacement
- Restripe to 3-lane section west of 7 St
- Removal of traffic signal at 7 St
- Change other traffic signal heads to reflect restriping

Continued evaluation and consultation with Center Avenue stakeholders will help the City to develop a recommendation on how to proceed with the larger scope of street improvements in the future, but not during the 2019 construction season.

New City Prosecutor's Office

The City of Moorhead began operation of its new City Prosecutor's Office on February 1, 2019. In Minnesota, cities are required to provide prosecution services for traffic offenses, misdemeanors and some gross misdemeanor crimes. Those services had been provided under contract from Clay County for the past 18 years, and by contract with local attorneys before that. After considering several options, and recognizing how much the city has grown, the City Council decided that prosecution would be best provided by developing an in-house department devoted solely to this work.

The office, located in City Hall, is led by the City Prosecutor, Cheryl Duysen, along with Assistant City Prosecutors, Steve Beitelspacher and Alex Stock. Erin Fildes, Paralegal, and Lacy Johnson, Victim Witness Services Specialist and Legal Assistant, provide support services. Together, the team prosecutes the majority of assaults, driving offenses, and property crimes committed in Moorhead, as well as vehicle forfeitures from repeat DWI offenders. The office has also taken on prosecution for the neighboring cities of Dilworth, Glyndon, and Barnesville, through agreements with those cities. Clay County continues to prosecute most gross misdemeanor and all felony crimes as required by state law.

Areas of focus in the office include:

 Driving offenses, especially impaired driving. All users of our roads deserve to use them with the reassurance of safety. When people are driving impaired, too fast, uninsured, or otherwise dangerously, prosecutors work with police officers who cited

- them to make sure unsafe drivers are held accountable and are deterred from repeating their mistakes.
- Assaults, especially domestic assaults. When the peace of our neighborhoods and homes is disturbed, prosecutors seek to hold offenders accountable and protect those who have been hurt. They also seek rehabilitation for offenders and prevention of future violence through court-ordered counseling or domestic violence programming.
- 3. Property crimes. When property is taken or damaged, or a person steals from a business, prosecutors work to restore the harm done and hold the offender accountable. In addition to fines, people are court-ordered to pay for what was taken.
- 4. First time offenders. When a person commits an offense, police, prosecutors, and judges naturally turn their attention to catching and punishing the offender. However, that is only half of the story. People who commit offenses are also people who live in our community. Therefore, rehabilitation is just as important as punishment. The City Prosecutor's Office knows this and offers opportunities to many first-time offenders to learn from their mistakes while minimizing damage to their criminal and driving records.

The City is pleased to be able to provide this improved service to the residents of Moorhead and neighboring towns, and the employees of the City Prosecutor's Office enjoy the opportunity to launch this department that contributes to making Moorhead even better.

Stormwater

Stormwater runoff from rain and snow flows over rooftops, streets, driveways, sidewalks, parking lots, and yard to storm drains. As it flows, it picks up pollutants such as pet waste, salt, pesticides, fertilizer, oil and grease, and other pollutants. The water drains directly into nearby ditches, stormwater ponds, and the Red River without treatment. Please check for vehicle leaks and responsibly dispose of all pollutants to help keep our City and river clean. If a hazardous spill has occurred, call 911.

Every year since 1990, the Moorhead Public Service Commission has implemented voluntary lawn-watering restrictions in an effort to remind us all how important the impacts of our daily water use can be. Being efficient with our water consumption ensures our infrastructure and source waters have sufficient supply for us all now and well into the future.

As summer temperatures rise, Moorhead Public Service (MPS) reminds everyone of water restrictions that helps make Moorhead a more sustainable city. Restrictions include odd-even lawn watering, where even numbered addresses water lawns on even days of the month and odd numbered addresses water lawns on odd days of the month. Similar timing for washing cars helps Moorhead remain a steward of water conservation. MPS customers are encouraged to conserve water throughout the summer when water is in its highest demand.
