US 10/75 Corridor Study

The City of Moorhead has been working with the Fargo-Moorhead Council of Governments (Metro COG), the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT), and MATBUS for the past year on studying the US 10 and US 75 corridors in Moorhead. The study identifies a vision for these two important routes through the city, ultimately setting the framework for a 2025 reconstruction project that MnDOT is planning.

The study looks to balance the needs of motorized and non-motorized traffic with business access, while considering the effects of changes on Main Avenue in downtown Fargo and traffic traveling through downtown Moorhead. The study is being guided by the following goals:

- Fit roadway to land uses (i.e., appropriate access and design)
- Accommodate appropriate users (i.e., complete streets)
- Create an environment that stimulates growth
- Provide flexibility for near and long-term transportation needs
- Improve "Gateway" feel for US 10 and US 75 corridors
- Develop and execute a project that meets the needs for 30+ years

Engaging the community

The US 10/US 75 corridors are unique and serve many land uses and corridor users. To ensure the proper balancing of needs between

motorized and non-motorized users while considering the benefits and impacts to local businesses, community input has been a major component of the study.

Gathering Input, Determining Needs, and Listening

Community outreach included a public meeting in the Summer of 2019 and several focus group meetings, as well as a survey and social media.

Based on community input and ongoing technical work, preliminary visions have been developed for the corridors focusing on the three focus areas: 1) downtown, 2) US 10 east of downtown, and 3) US 75 south of downtown. These visions are guiding the concepts currently being developed.

What you can expect next

The study partners are wrapping-up the study this fall. This includes refining and evaluating conceptual drawings of the corridor visions. Recommendations, along with an implementation plan for construction, will be shared with the community this November.

What You Need to Know About the Hands-Free Law

Minnesota motorists are no longer allowed to hold a cell phone while driving. The Minnesota Hands-Free Law went into effect on August 1st, 2019. That means no dialing, texting, scrolling or even typing in an address while using a phone as a GPS. Drivers can complete phone calls, send voice-activated text messages, listen to podcasts and use a phone to get directions, provided it's all done without touching the phone. The Minnesota Department of Public Safety, Office of Traffic Safety, has launched a website, <http://handsfreemn.org> to answer many questions drivers have on the new law. Here are just a few highlights:

What can I do under the new law?

The new law allows a driver to use a cell phone to make calls, text, listen to music or podcasts and get directions, but only by voice commands or single-touch activation without holding the phone.

What can't I do with my phone under the new law?

You may not hold your phone in your hand. Also, a driver may not use their phone at any time for video calling, video live-streaming, Snapchat, gaming, looking at video or photos stored on the phone, using non-navigation apps, reading texts, scrolling, or typing on the phone.

Can I pick up my phone to make a call while I'm at a stoplight?

No, you are still technically operating a motor vehicle even while you're stopped in traffic or at a red light (this would also include while stopped waiting for a train to pass).

Can I ever hold my phone?

Yes, hand-held phone use is allowed to obtain emergency assistance if there is an immediate threat to life and safety, or when in an authorized emergency vehicle while performing official duties. (Although there is exemption for emergency vehicles, MPD has upgraded their squad cars with hands-free capabilities to minimize officers' need to be holding their phones.)

Are there penalties?

Yes, the first ticket is \$50 plus court fees and the second and later tickets are \$275 plus court fees.

Go to handsfreemn.org to educate yourself on other important information including using GPS navigation, teen drivers with a permit or provisional driver's license, holding a phone in a hijab or other type of headscarf or wrap, and learn about several ways to go hands-free.

Moorhead's Legislative Requests – Capital Projects



The State of Minnesota is a tremendous funding partner in many local projects. The state periodically sells bonds for capital improvements that include transportation and infrastructure improvements, higher education, and community facilities. The City of Moorhead and Clay County have requests pending for capital projects that benefit our community and our residents:

- **Clay County Resource Recovery Campus (Transfer Station)** – replaces 40 year old facilities and improves safety to responsibly handle solid waste, household hazardous waste, and problem materials. Project location: 1701 34 St N
- **11 Street Railroad Underpass** – creates a downtown underpass to separate rail traffic from auto and pedestrian

traffic, improving safety, mobility, and emergency response.

- **Flood Mitigation** – continues/completes Moorhead's in-town flood mitigation efforts and participation in the Fargo-Moorhead Diversion Project.
- **Moorhead Community & Aquatics Center** – develops a 50-meter competition-sized pool and diving well, outdoor splash pad, senior programming areas, gathering spaces, and child care. Location: to be determined

The City will work with our state legislators, Senator Kent Eken, Representative Ben Lien, and Representative Paul Marquart to advocate for these important infrastructure projects and community amenities during the 2020 Legislative Session, beginning February 11.

Southeast Main|20 St|21 St Underpass

The SE Main|20 St|21 St intersection was one of about 20 diagonal at-grade railroad crossings in the State of Minnesota. Constructing an underpass at this intersection for auto and pedestrian traffic is the largest transportation project in the history of Moorhead.

Project facts and figures:

- 15-year search for funding with all possible funding pursued
 - Design & property acquisition supported by direct Congressional appropriations of Federal funding
 - Seven unsuccessful Federal grant applications (2011 – 2017)
 - BNSF contributing more than statutory requirement
- Total cost, from initial study & design to construction, is \$72.9M. Funding breakdown:
 - State of Minnesota \$48.3M
 - Federal \$ 5.5M
 - City of Moorhead \$13.4M (subject to cost-saving measures)
 - BNSF \$ 5.7M
- 335,000 cubic yards of dirt will be removed for underpass, which will be 30 feet at deepest point.
- Project materials include 1,500 tons of steel.
- 418,000 square feet of concrete paving and 19 miles of concrete piling.
- Railroad will stay operational during construction by means of "shoofly" temporary track.
- Construction began in July 2018. The project will open late summer of 2020.
- The primary contractor is Ames Construction; the City's consultants are SRF Consulting Group and Braun Intertec.

Potential Carbon Monoxide Sources in Your Home

Chimney
Clogged or blocked chimney opening

Carbon Monoxide Dangers

- Often called the invisible killer, carbon monoxide is an odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. Test your carbon monoxide (CO) alarms at least once a month, and change batteries twice a year. Alarms should be installed within 10 feet of your sleeping areas.
- As we dig out from snowstorms, remember to clear your fire hydrants, house vents, furnace intake pipes, and gas meters. Keeping your natural gas meter and appliance exhaust vents clear is important to ensure your meter is not damaged, your gas service is not interrupted, carbon monoxide isn't created, and prevent an appliance malfunction.

Smart Salting Tips

As we endure heavy snowfall and bitter cold, most of us will rely on salt to clear sidewalks, driveways and parking lots. Salt helps keep surfaces free from ice but can have a negative effect on the nearby environment. You can help reduce the amount of salt used by using smart salting strategies, which will also save money as well as reduce damage to infrastructure, vehicles, plants and water supplies.

You can do your part to prevent salt pollution by following some simple tips:

- Shovel – the more snow and ice removed manually, the less you will have to use salt.
- 15 degrees F is too cold for salt. Most salts stop working at this temperature. Use sand instead for traction, but remember that sand does not melt ice.
- Apply less. More salt does not mean more melting. Be patient.

These products take time to work.

- Use less than 4 pounds of salt per 1,000 square feet. One pound of salt is approximately a heaping 12-ounce coffee cup.
- Use a hand held spreader to help you apply a consistent amount.
- Sweep up extra salt and sand if visible on dry pavement. It is no longer doing any work and will be washed away. Use it somewhere else or throw it away.

In March, every residence will receive Census postcards in the US Mail (both winter & summer addresses). Please only fill out your Census for Moorhead. The Post Office will not forward these postcards.

Snow Removal

During the winter season, the Public Works Department follows weather forecasts to prepare for snow events in the area. If temperature and precipitation allow, primary routes are pretreated with an anti-ice solution to reduce the potential for icing and slippery conditions. Once the snow falls, Public Works crews work to keep emergency snow routes open. Primary snow routes are the first priority, followed by secondary routes. These primary and secondary routes are the major streets that keep traffic moving throughout Moorhead.

After the snowfall ends and the primary and secondary routes are cleared, Public Works crews begin city-wide plowing operations. Our goal is to plow all streets within 24 hours after the snowfall ends. Additional snow, ice, and high winds can impact our ability to meet this goal; therefore, the timeline may be extended if another snow event follows closely behind. Public Works does not have the capability to run full 24/7 operations; however, we do stagger staff shifts when necessary to provide around-the-clock coverage.

City Public Works crews are ready to provide outstanding service for the 2019-2020 snow season! Thank you in advance for your patience and understanding during snow removal operations. For more information on our snow removal process and timeline, visit the Public Works page at cityofmoorhead.com.

MATBUS

Introducing the MATPASS



MATBUS is revamping its fare cards with smart technology to simplify the process for riders. Instead of having a different card for each type of pass, the new MATPASS can be loaded with all types of unlimited ride passes and 10-ride cards. The MATPASS will also have space on

the back for a Rider ID, including the rider's picture. This will help verify eligibility for discount fares, and make it easier to tell cards apart in multi-rider households. The Rider ID section will be required for all discount fares, and is also available for those paying adult fares.

There will be no cost for the MATPASS card, but lost cards will have a replacement fee. If a card is lost, MATBUS will deactivate the lost card and transfer the balance of time to a replacement card. These MATPASS cards will be phased in as old inventory runs out.

Quarter Days for Holiday Shopping

MATBUS will be offering a special rate for riders on prime shopping days this holiday season! On Black Friday and Small Business Saturday (November 23-24), plus every Saturday in December, you can ride MATBUS fixed route buses for just 25¢! Avoid cold cars and busy parking lots, and hop on a warm MATBUS vehicle

during Quarter Days.

The MATBUS app is your best rider resource while you're out and about! Use the trip planner (powered by Google Maps) to find your bus stop and route. Track the buses in real time, so you don't have to wait in the cold longer than necessary. You can also view brochures and connect with MATBUS.
