MoorHeart Recognition: Sadiyo Osman

RECOMMENDATION:

The City Council is asked to recognize and honor Sadiyo Osman with the MoorHeart award.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The MoorHeart award recognizes individuals and organizations that go above and beyond to demonstrate community within our City by their actions and service. A team of volunteers from City boards and commissions selects award recipients who are recognized at City Council meetings. For the March 2023 award, the MoorHeart selection committee chose to recognize Sadiyo Osman for her outstanding service and volunteerism to the community of Moorhead, specifically her efforts in teaching early childhood development and childcare, as well as tutoring English to new Americans.

Sadiyo offers her skills to new Americans at the Afro-American Development Association. She connects with those hoping to learn new skillsets in order to create new personal opportunities. New Americans are able to utilize the Afro-American Development Association and its resources in order to find opportunities and feel at home in Moorhead. Sadiyo volunteers her time and skills to lift those hoping to learn English or understand childcare and childcare licensing.

Lisa Arnold wrote in the nomination: I have witnessed firsthand how valuable Sadiyo's work is for our students. Sadiyo is a first-generation Somali American whose background allows her to connect deeply with our students (many of whom are Somali) both culturally and linguistically. It took courage for Sadiyo to decide to volunteer with us, as she is not a native speaker of English herself and, most of the time, immigrants do not feel they are "qualified" to teach English. Sadiyo is not only a solid English tutor, but she's been extremely helpful in translating for our lowest-level students, who can become lost or intimidated if they have to communicate completely in English. Sadiyo has also taken the initiative to bring a training program to our students so that they can begin receiving child care training once a month that will not only enhance their understanding of child development but can also lead to licensure for at-home child care. This new training will be a great boom for many of our students who are otherwise not employed or who are not happy with their current employment. In addition to her volunteer work, Sadiyo's character deserves recognition. Her strength and integrity are inspiring to me and everyone at AADA, and I hope she can be recognized with the MoorHeart award so that she can be seen as a role model for other young New American women in the community.

The MoorHeart nomination committee thanks Sadiyo for her compassion and acknowledges the efforts that she makes to change the lives of so many individuals. Her inclusive, service-oriented personality shows that we can all become better connected with effort and determination. Sadiyo is a wonderful role model.

Public Hearing on Community Development Block Grant 2023 Annual Action Plan

RECOMMENDATION:

This is a public hearing only. The Mayor and City Council are asked to receive public comments on the draft 2023 Annual Action Plan for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and the draft Amended Citizens Participation Plan. Formal consideration of the 2023 Annual Action Plan and Citizen Participation Plan is scheduled for March 27, 2023.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

Draft 2023 Annual Action Plan: The City has developed its CDBG Annual Action Plan as part of its corresponding five-year plan as required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Citizen participation includes:

- Public Meeting (October 4, 2022)
- 30-day comment period (ending March 25, 2023)
- Public hearing (March 13, 2023)
- Final plan consideration by City Council (March 27, 2023)

Draft Amended Citizens Participation Plan: HUD requires Grantees to adopt and periodically update a Citizen Participation Plan that sets forth the City's policies and procedures for citizen participation related to its CDBG programs. The existing plan is proposed to remove expired COVID-19 references and to increase the minimum budget necessitating a substantial amendment from the greater of \$5,000 or more than 25% of an activity budget, to the greater of \$20,000 or 25% of activity budget.

Funds are provided on a deferred loan basis to CCRI. No interest accrues on the loan and the entire principal balance must be repaid upon sale, title transfer, or CCRI vacancy of the property. The program will be administered by CCRI. Eligible activity in accordance with CFR Part 570.201 (a). National Objective Activity benefiting low- and moderate-income persons. Includes \$500 Program Administration. | \$40,500 |

CDBG resources will be used for construction materials and assistive devices (e.g., door handles, grab bars) and/or labor; eligibility applications are managed by Freedom Resource Center and ramps are constructed either by Freedom Resource Center, volunteers of the Remodeler's Council of the Home Builders Association of Fargo-Moorhead, or paid contractors. Applications from interested individuals are accepted by Freedom Resource Center on a first-come, first-served basis. The program is administered by the Freedom Resource Center and the City of Moorhead. CDBG funds will be offered as a grant. (\$4,000 Contract Amount/\$200 Activity Administration). 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Public Services Eligible activities in accordance with **CFR Part** 570.201(e). National Objective: Activity benefiting low- and moderateincome persons.

Recreation Program - Romkey: Recreation activity programming, meal program and/or activities for youth in low-income neighborhoods conducted by Moorhead Parks & Recreation at 900 19 St. S. Participating youth range in age from 3-17 years; the predominant age of participants is under 12 years. Budget: \$6,200 (\$6,000 program/\$200 Activity Administration)

Mobile Recreation for Youth: Recreation opportunities in Moorhead's Queens (3201 20 St S), Belsly (3500 12 St S), and Stonemill (1210 45 Ave S) Parks by means of the Boys & Girls Club of the Red River Valley's P.O.D. "Play Outside Daily" truck, which is staffed by recreation leaders and filled with play equipment. The truck travels to metro area parks that do not have regular youth programming. The P.O.D. program focuses on physical activity, relationship building, and character development. CDBG funding will be used to offset Boys & Girls Club costs in Moorhead neighborhoods where at least 51% of the participants are from low to moderate-income households. Budget: \$7,200 (\$7,000 program/\$200 Activity Administration).

Opportunities Under Transit ["OUT"] Transportation Initiative: Discounted bus pass voucher program for persons who are homeless or extremely low income (less than 30% median income) to provide transportation to and from employment or job training. OUT will provide two monthly bus passes per participant per year. The program will be administered by Metro Area Transit, 701.476.6782. Budget: \$10,200 (\$10,000 program/\$200

Activity Administration).

Homebuyer Education: Educational program to inform consumers on what they can afford in a home, how to qualify for a mortgage, and how to be a responsible homeowner. RECOMMENDATION:

- 3. Authorize the Mayor and City Manager to execute contracts with FTA.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

On September 27, 2021, the City Council approved submission of capital grant applications to the State of Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) for the four-year period 2022-2026. The State of Minnesota has selected Moorhead to receive \$480,320 in FTA Section 5339 funding for four projects listed in the following table.

In addition, FTA Section 5307 funds are being requested to supplement one of the projects (AVA/AVL Software for the Fixed Routes) due to cost increases. Moorhead receives an annual apportionment of Section 5307 funds that can be used for operating, planning and capital projects. The funds can be carried forward up to five years to prepare for larger projects. Four 5307 projects are included in the draft 2023 capital grant application.

The State of Minnesota allocated CRP funds to Moorhead to assist with increasing construction costs for the Dilworth Walmart Transit Hub.

A public hearing is required prior to submission of grant applications to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). Therefore, a public hearing has been scheduled tonight for the following capital grant projects:

Resolution to Adopt Revised Special Assessment Policy

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider a resolution to adopt a Revised Special Assessment Policy.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The City's Special Assessment Policy provides guidance and direction for the use of special assessments under the authority provided by Minnesota Statutes Annotated, Chapter 429, other related State statutes, and City Charter. The City utilizes special assessments to fund public improvement projects and to collect unpaid penalties and charges. For public improvement projects, the proposed special assessment procedures address:

- 1. The determination of the need, cost-effectiveness, feasibility, and timing of the improvements;
- 2. The determination of the assessable share of the cost (i.e., the project benefits) based on the type of improvements; and
- 3. The equitable apportionment of the assessable cost among the benefited property owners.

The City's initial Special Assessment Policy was adopted in January, 1981. Major revisions to the policy were adopted in January, 2005 with additional minor revisions adopted in May, 2012.

In 2020, staff initiated a review of the City's current policy. Policy review and revision included staff from the Engineering Department, Community Development Department, Administration, and City Attorney. Two presentations were provided to the City Council at workshops to provide updates and solicit input.

The proposed policy includes numerous non-substantive revisions that clarify and/or document practices that have been utilized for many years. These revisions will assist staff with future implementation given the cross-departmental responsibilities associated with special assessments and the relative infrequency of policy revisions. The proposed policy also includes a few more significant revisions that were deemed necessary to address legal decisions and/or long-term financial implications. A summary of the more significant revisions is included in the attached table.

The policy establishes procedures for the scope of the most common public infrastructure projects. The scope and/or magnitude of certain improvements may require project-specific considerations that deviate from the policy and would be approved by the City Council.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

There is no cost associated with adoption of the revised policy.

Public improvements may be constructed without using special assessments; however, the City has limited funding options and it is generally not economically feasible under current statutes to avoid special assessments altogether. Application of the revised policy involves numerous financial considerations that are addressed through separate actions including, but not limited to, City budget and capital improvement plan approval, improvement bond issuance, public improvement project authorization, development agreements, and collection of unpaid penalties and charges. Each of these actions typically includes specific consideration and/or authorization by the City Council and frequently involve Public Hearings. The revised policy has been written to recognize City Council authority to deviate from policy and/or standard practices as may be appropriate.

The proposed revisions are intended to facilitate the continued use of special assessments as a funding tool, to equitably assign costs to benefiting properties, and to promote the long-term financial health of the City.

Resolution to Approve Plans & Specifications and Authorize Advertisement for Bids for Proposed 2nd Ave N Area Underground Utility & Street Improvements (Eng. No. 23-A2-04A and 14-02-03F)

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider a resolution to approve plans & specifications and authorize advertisement for bids for the above-referenced project.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The proposed project includes street and/or underground utility work along 2nd Ave N from 8th to 12th St, 10th St from 1st to 2nd Ave N, and 12th St from 1st to 2nd Ave N (map attached). The street improvements on 2nd Ave N and 12th St N are included in the City's 2023-2027 Capital Improvement Plan and are scheduled for construction in 2023. The project also includes sanitary sewer and water utility relocation that must be completed in advance of the proposed 11th St Underpass Project, which is anticipated to begin construction in 2024.

On December 12, 2022, the City Council ordered the preparation of the Preliminary Engineer's Report (PER), to consider making of improvements to these streets. The report was completed by City staff under the direction of the City Engineer and made recommendations for various street and utility improvements, and was received by the Council on February 27, 2023. Following receipt of the report, the Council ordered preparation of plans & specifications for the making of the recommended improvements as proposed in the report.

WSB has prepared plans & specifications for the proposed improvements under the direction of the City Engineer. The streets within this project area have been combined into one contract to simplify construction administration and maximize the economy of scale, while keeping the total contract size to a scope that is suitable for most local contractors. City staff recommends that the Council approve the plans & specifications and authorize advertisement for bids.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

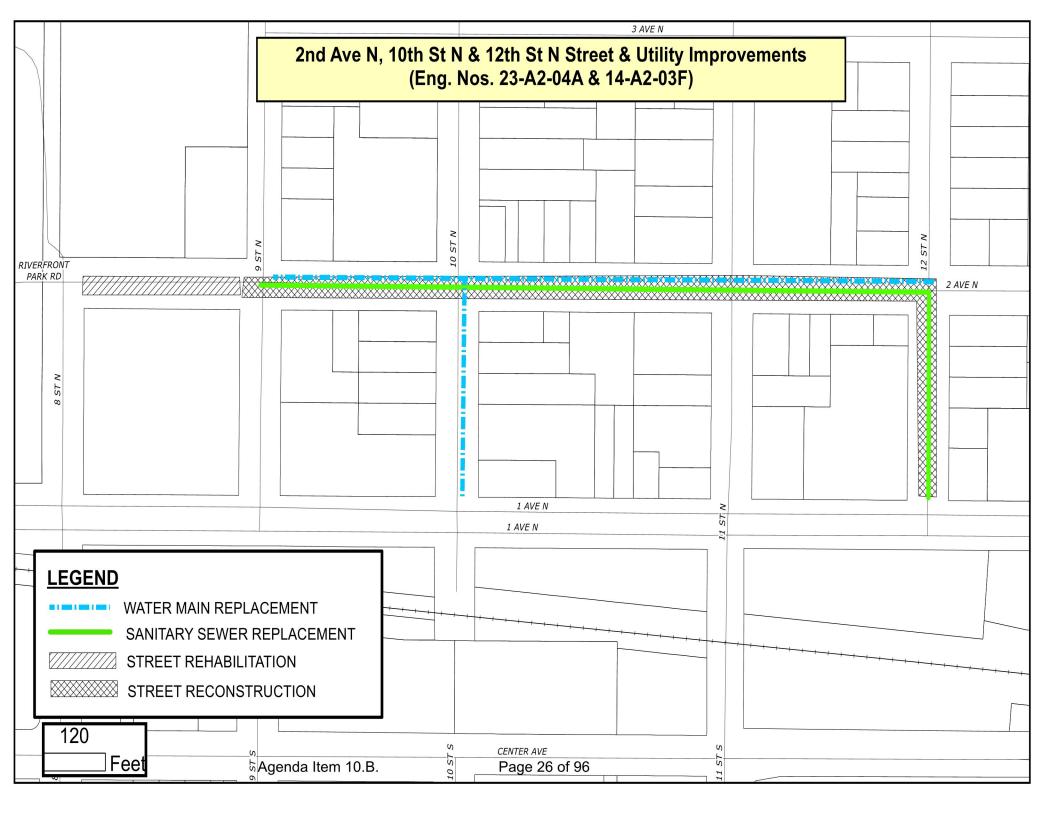
The cost of the above requested actions is negligible at this time, and consists of printing and mailing costs. The total project cost, including contingencies and fees, is preliminarily estimated at \$4,870,000. Approximately \$3,291,400 of this cost is for the relocation of City utilities in advance of the 11th St Underpass Project, and will be reimbursed by the State as part of the 11 St Underpass Project. It is proposed to finance the City share of the project cost (\$1,359,600) through the PIR Fund using a General Obligation Improvement Bond, and to assess approximately \$231,800 of the total project cost to the benefiting properties in accordance with the City's Special Assessment Policy. The balance of the project cost (\$1,127,800) will be paid as a City share.

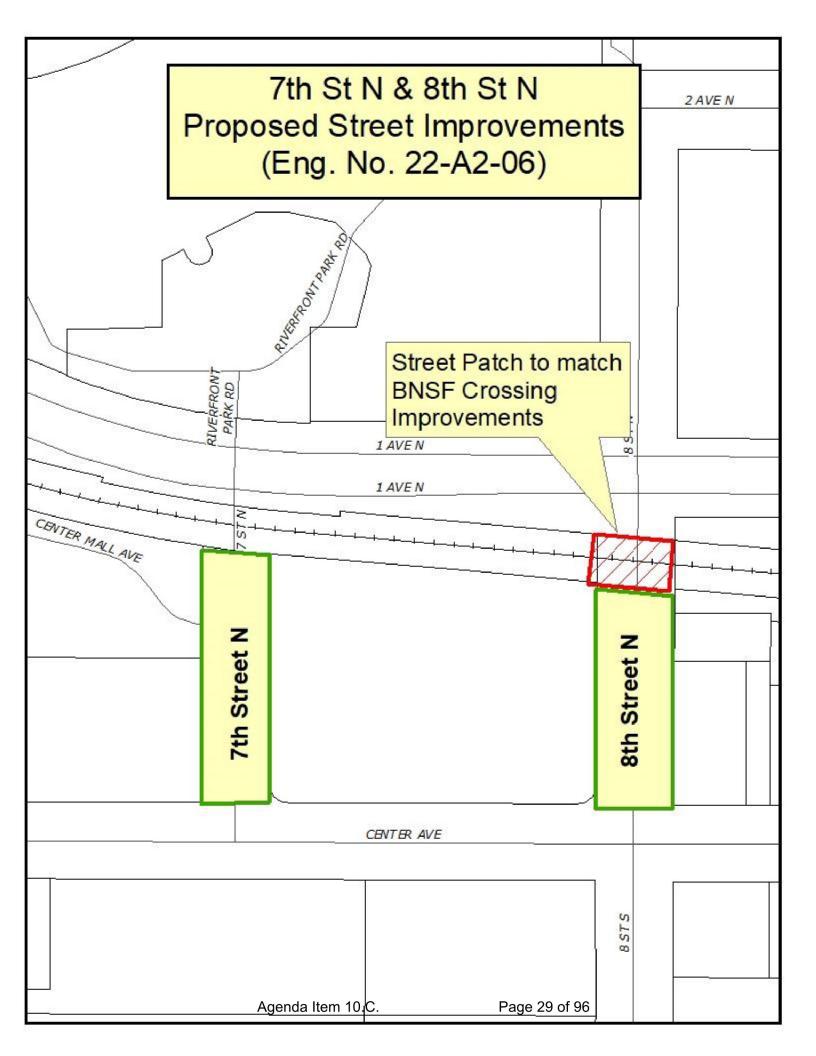

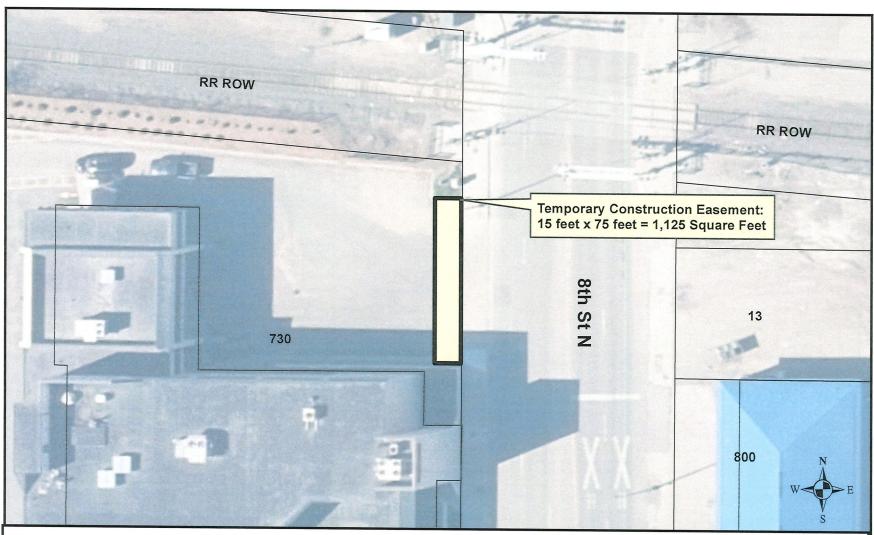

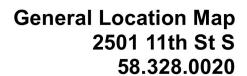

- 3. The property is zoned MU-3: Commercial Mixed Use, which allows structures to exceed 45 feet in height with a conditional use permit.
- 4. A public hearing was held by the Planning Commission on April 4, 2022 on the Application allowing all interested persons an opportunity to speak, full and complete record of which is detailed in the minutes of the Moorhead Planning Commission.

 - The proposed use is compatible with the mix of residential and commercial present and future uses of the area.
- The proposed use conforms to all performance standards contained herein (i.e. parking, loading, noise, etc.).
 - During plan review, all performance standards will be reviewed to meet Moorhead City Codes and Minnesota Building Code.
- d. The proposed use will not tend to or actually have an adverse effect on the area in which it is proposed.
 - The proposed use will not tend to or actually have an adverse effect on the area in which is it proposed.
- e. Traffic generated by the proposed use is within the capabilities of streets serving the property.
 - The proposed use will be accommodated by the existing capabilities of the streets and parking areas serving the property.

LOT 2, BLOCK 1, HOLIDAY CENTER THIRD ADDITION

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider a Conditional Use Permit for an existing Dynamic Display Sign within 150 feet of an area zoned for residential use at 303 30th St N.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS: The American Legion was issued a sign permit in August 2022 for a dynamic display/electronic sign. Because the sign was within 150 feet of a residential zoning district, the sign was permitted to change messages up to once per hour. The American Legion now requests that the sign be able to change more frequently therefore triggering the Conditional Use Permit requirement.

Staff recommended that the original condition of messages changing once per hour be kept as a condition because of the proximity to a residential district/home. Following the hearing and discussion, the Planning Commission recommended the sign change no more than once per minute and operates between 6:00 AM and 10:00 PM.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on March 6, 2023 and unanimously recommended approval with the conditions noted in the attached resolution. One public comment was received stating they could see the sign from their dining room window, but have no objections to the Conditional Use Permit. 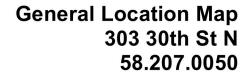

- 6. The City of Moorhead reserves the right to inspect the property for compliance with these conditions at any time and for any reason.
- 7. Any and all claims that arise or may arise against Applicant, its agents, servants, or employees while engaged in the use of the Property, shall in no way be the obligation of the City of Moorhead. Furthermore, Applicant, its agents servants, employees, or assigns shall indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the City, its officers and employees against any and all liability, loss, costs, damages, expenses, claims, actions, or judgments, including attorneys' fees which the City, its officers or employees may hereafter sustain, incur, or be required to pay, in anyway connected with the use of the Property or City actions related to the granting of this Conditional Use Permit.
- 8. Any improvements made to the property in connection with this Conditional Use Permit shall be at the sole expense of the Applicant or Owner and shall not be the obligation of the City.
- 9. If Applicant fails to observe the terms and conditions of this Conditional Use Permit, the City may revoke this Conditional Use Permit. In such an event, the City will give owner at least a ten (10) day notice of revocation at a revocation hearing for the Conditional Use Permit stating the time, place and purpose of such hearing. 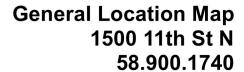

Second Reading of Ordinance 2023-02: An Ordinance to Amend Section 3-4-9.C Recyclable Material and Section 3-4-11.C Yard Waste of the Moorhead City Code

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Second Reading & Title & Summary of Ordinance 2023-2: An Ordinance to Amend Section 3-4-9.C Recyclable Material and Section 3-4-11.C Yard Waste of the Moorhead City Code.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

This item is in regards to MinnKota Recycling's request to no longer allow glass in single stream recycling containers in Moorhead and Fargo. The reasons to no longer accept glass include:

- Economic feasibility of recycling glass
- Worker safety related to glass recycling processes
- Contaminating other recyclable materials by glass
- Diminishment and marketability of other material when glass is in the single recycling stream

Moorhead residents are still able to bring glass to drop sites at Woodlawn Park, the Public Works Maintenance Shop, and Clay County Resource Recovery Center. This change would be effectively immediately.

In addition, staff has been asked to present a proposal to only accept lawn waste in compostable bags, paper bags or reusable containers, effectively prohibiting the use of clear bags. The benefits of prohibiting clear plastic bags include less litter created from bags blowing in and from the compost site, minimizing maintenance costs of processing equipment, and eliminating contamination in finished compost. This change would be effective September 1, 2023. The first reading of ordinance passed on February 27, 2023.

- A. Purpose: The purpose of this section is to reduce the amount of waste generated in the City by voluntarily disposing of recyclable materials either through no-sort recycling methods or through separation of recyclable materials.
- B. No-Sort Recycling: Single dwelling housing and multi-dwelling housing units are authorized to participate in no-sort recycling unless otherwise authorized by the Public Works Director. The City will provide totes to all single dwelling homes and containers or dumpsters for multiple dwelling homes. Damaged totes, containers, and dumpsters will be replaced by the City in a timely manner. Recyclables must fit inside the recycling container; additional recyclables will not be picked up by the City. The resident can either wait until the next curb-side collection or drop-off recyclables at one of the City's recycling drop-off locations
- C. Commingled: Residents of single dwellings, multi-dwellings, or other buildings as authorized by the Director of Public Works, may participate in the City's plan of no-sort recycling. The <u>City Council will by resolution designate</u> following recyclable materials which may be commingled from the normal garbage, rubbish and waste material collection if the materials have not been contaminated (a detailed recyclables list <u>and a copy of the resolution</u> is located on the City of Moorhead website):
- 1. Newspaper: Includes inserts, shoppers, or other publications printed on newspaper stock.
- 2. Magazines: Glossy publications less than one inch (1") thick.
- 3. Rinsed clear and colored glass bottles, jugs, or jars; glass does not need to be separated from color.
- 4. Aluminum, tin and steel cans.
- 5. #1-7 plastics without rings, caps or lids.
- 6. Flattened corrugated cardboard.

3-4-11: YARD WASTE:

- A. Purpose: The purpose of this section is to reduce the amount of waste generated in the City by a separate collection of yard waste.
- B. Definition: Yard waste for purposes of this section shall include grass clippings, leaves and garden waste.
- C. Collection Of Yard Waste: Yard waste will be collected and placed out for collection <u>as provided by resolution of the City Council</u>. on the same day as regularly scheduled garbage collection provided that yard waste is to be put into clear plastic compostable bags or non-disposable containers appropriately marked as yard waste.
- D. Rates: Any additional fee or rate, if any, for garbage collection for persons who participate in the collection of yard waste under this section shall be set by resolution of the City Council. (Ord. 2017-08, 7-10-2017)

RECOMMENDATION:

To approve Ordinance 2023-04: An Ordinance to Amend Section 6-2B Control of Invasive Species Tree Pests

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

Larvae believed to be Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) was discovered in Moorhead by Forestry staff doing routine pruning on February 10, 2023. Subsequent samples and testing by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA) resulted in an emergency quarantine of the western portion of Clay County, from State Highway 9 west to the North Dakota border, which limits the movement of firewood and ash material out of the area effective March 2, 2023.

The Forestry Division of Public Works intends to implement their Emerald Ash Borer Management Plan to contain and slow the spread of the disease. The plan effectively removes smaller, less valuable ash trees and chemically treats those larger than 11" in diameter. This plan is the most cost effective and environmentally conscious way to preserve ash trees in the urban forest and has been successfully utilized in other communities.

These ordinance amendments would provide the City the authority to implement their Emerald Ash Borer program, similar to the one in place to address Dutch Elm Disease and address any future pests deemed a regulated invasive species by the Minnesota Department of Agriculture.

ORDINANCE 2023-04

An Ordinance to Amend Section 6-2B Control of Invasive Species Tree Pests

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MOORHEAD AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE B. CONTROL OF INVASIVE SPECIES TREE PESTS DUTCH ELM DISEASE CONTROL

SECTION:

- 6-2B-1: Declaration Of Policy NUISANCE DECLARED
- <u>6-2B-2</u>: <u>Dutch Elm Disease Program NUISANCE PROHIBITED</u>
- <u>6-2B-3</u>: <u>Declaration Of Nuisance And Abatement INSPECTION AND INVESTIGATION;</u> RIGHT TO ENTER
- 6-2B-4: Inspection And Investigation ABATEMENT ON PUBLIC PROPERTY
- 6-2B-5: Abatement Policies ABATEMENT ON PRIVATE PROPERTY
- 6-2B-6: Prohibited Acts
- **6-2B-7**: Penalty

6-2B-1: DECLARATION OF POLICY: NUISANCE DECLARED

The council has determined that the health of the elm trees within the municipal limits is threatened by a fatal disease known as the Dutch elm disease. It has further determined that the loss of elm trees growing on public and private property would substantially depreciate the value of property within the city and impair the safety, good order, general welfare and convenience of the public. It is declared to be the intention of the council to control and prevent the spread of this disease and this article is enacted for that purpose. (Ord. 427, 2-10-1969)

To protect, preserve and conserve the value of public and private lands, and to promote the general welfare of the public and this community, it is necessary to protect, control and abate trees that create a public hazard. The following examples are public nuisances whenever they may be found within the city:

- (a) Any living or standing tree or part thereof infected to any degree or infested with any Minnesota Department of Agriculture regulated invasive species pest; or
- (b) Any dead tree or part thereof, including logs, branches, stumps, firewood or other tree material from which the infected and-or infested part has not been removed and burned or sprayed with an effective pesticide

6-2B-2: DUTCH ELM DISEASE PROGRAM: NUISANCE PROHIBITED:

It is the intention of the council to conduct a program of plant pest control pursuant to the authority granted by Minnesota statutes, section <u>18G.13</u> <u>18.022</u>, as such statute may be from time to time amended, supplemented or replaced. This program is directed specifically at the control and elimination of <u>plant pests that infest trees within the City Dutch elm disease fungus and elm bark beetles and is undertaken at the recommendation of the commissioner of agriculture. The city manager shall act as coordinator between the commissioner of agriculture and the council in the conduct of this program. (Ord. 427, 2-10-1969)</u>

It is unlawful for any person to permit any public nuisance as defined in section 6-2B-1 to remain on any premises owned or controlled by said person within the city. Such nuisance may be abated in the manner described in the chapter.

6-2B-3: DECLARATION OF NUISANCE AND ABATEMENT:

- A. Nuisances Declared: The following things are public nuisances whenever they may be found within the city:
- 1. Any living or standing elm tree or part thereof infected to any degree with the Dutch Elm disease fungus Ceratoystis Ulmi (Buisman) Moreau or which harbors any of the elm bark beetles Scolytus Multistriatus (Eichh.) or Hylumgopinus Rufipes (Marsh).
- 2. Any dead elm tree or part thereof, including branches, stumps, firewood or other elm material, from which the bark has not been removed and burned or sprayed with an effective elm bark beetle insecticide.
- B. Abatement: It is unlawful for any person to permit any public nuisance as defined in subsection A to remain on any premises owned or controlled by that person within the City. Such nuisances may be abated in the manner prescribed by this Article.

6-2B-4 3: INSPECTION AND INVESTIGATION; RIGHT TO ENTER:

- A. Annual Inspection: All premises and places within the City shall be inspected by authorized City personnel as often as practicable, but in no event less than once each year, to determine whether any condition described in Section 6-2B-3A 2 exists thereon. All reported incidents of infestation by Dutch Elm fungus or elm bark beetles by an invasive species tree pest shall be promptly investigated.
- B. Entry on Private Premises: Authorized City personnel, upon providing proper identification to and securing the consent of the owner or other lawful occupant of the premises, or by lawful search warrant, may enter upon private premises at any reasonable time for the purpose of carrying out any of the duties assigned under this Article; provided that prior to commencing performance of any other of such duties, an authorized City Employee or agent shall endeavor to provide verbal notice to an occupant of the subject premises of his identity and the purpose of his entry onto the premises.
 - C. Diagnosis: If conditions indicating Dutch Elm infestation are found, appropriate specimens or samples shall either immediately be sent to the Commissioner of Agriculture for analysis, or shall be analyzed in accordance with such other steps for diagnosis as may be recommended by the Commissioner. Except as provided in Section 6-2B-5B, no action to remove infected trees or wood shall be taken until positive diagnosis of the disease has been made.
 - C. It is unlawful to prevent, delay or interfere with a tree inspector while they are engaged in the performance of duties imposed by this article.
 - D. <u>Upon finding conditions indicating an invasive species tree pest infection and-or infestation, appropriate specimens or samples shall be taken for verification purposes.</u>

6-2B-54: ABATEMENT POLICIES ON PUBLIC PROPERTY:

A. Procedures Available: In abating the nuisances defined in Section 6-2B-3A, authorized City personnel shall cause the infected tree or wood to be sprayed, removed, burned or otherwise effectively treated so as to destroy and prevent as fully as possible the spread of Dutch Elm disease fungus and elm bark beetles. Such abatement procedures shall be

carried out in accordance with current technical and expert opinions and plans as may be designated by the Commissioner of Agriculture.

A In abating the nuisances defined in section 6-2B-1, the infected or infested tree or wood shall be removed and burned or otherwise effectively treated to destroy and prevent as full as possible the spread of the invasive species tree pest. Such abatement procedures shall be carried out in accordance with current technical and expert methods and plans as may be designated by the commissioner of agriculture of the state of Minnesota or by the commissioner of natural resources of the State of Minnesota. Specifications for tree removal and disposal methods consistent therewith shall be established by the Director, City Forester, or other appropriate designee.

B. Removal of Infected Trees and Wood:

- 1. Whenever the City finds with reasonable certainty that the infestation defined in Section 6-2B-3A exists in any tree or wood in any public or private place in the City, the following procedures shall be followed:
- a. If authorized City personnel find that the danger of infestation of other elm trees is not imminent because of elm dormancy, a written report of the findings in this regard shall be filed with the Council which shall proceed by 1) abating the nuisance as a public improvement under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 429, as such chapter may be from time to time amended, supplemented or replaced, or 2) abating the nuisance as provided in paragraph 2 of this subsection.
- b. If authorized City personnel find that danger of infestation of other elm trees is imminent, the abutting property owner shall be notified by the City by certified mail that the nuisance will be abated within a specified time, not less than five (5) days from the date of mailing of such notice. The authorized City personnel shall immediately report such action to the City Manager, and after the expiration of the time limited by the notice the City may abate the nuisance.
- 2. Upon receipt of the report required by paragraph 1a above, the Council shall, by resolution, order the nuisance abated. Before action is taken on such resolution, the Council shall publish in its official newspaper notice of its intention to meet to consider taking action to abate the nuisance. This notice shall be mailed to affected property owners and published once no less than one week prior to such meeting. The notice shall state the time and place of the meeting, the streets affected, action proposed, the estimated cost of abatement, and the proposed basis of assessment costs, if any. At such hearing or adjournment thereof, the Council shall hear property owners with reference to the scope and desirability of the proposed project. The Council shall thereafter adopt a resolution confirming the original resolution with such modifications as it considers desirable and provide for the doing of the work.
- 3. On or before September 1 of each year the City Clerk shall list the total unpaid charges for each abatement against each separate lot or parcel to which they are attributable under this Article. The Council may then spread the charges or any portion thereof against the property involved as a special assessment under Minnesota Statutes, section 429.101, as such statute may be from time to time amended, supplemented or replaced, and other pertinent statutes for certification to the County Auditor and collection the following year along with current taxes.

C. Spraying Elm Trees:

1. Whenever any elm tree or elm wood within the City is determined to be infected with Dutch Elm fungus, all nearby high value elm trees may be sprayed with an effective elm bark beetle destroying concentrate. Spraying activities authorized by this subsection shall be conducted in

accordance with technical and expert opinions and plans of the Commissioner of Agriculture and under the supervision of the Commissioner and the Commissioner's agent whenever possible.

2. The notice provisions of Section 6-2B-5B apply to spraying operations conducted under this subsection.

6-2B-5: ABATEMENT POLICIES ON PRIVATE PROPERTY.

- A. Whenever a nuisance, as defined in section 6-2B-1, is found to exist within any developed portion or utilized portions of any parcel or within 100 feet of such developed/utilized areas of any property that may lie within non-maintained naturally wooded areas on private property, the owner or person in control of such property shall be notified in writing, or by mail or personal delivery, that such conditions exist. The notice shall also state that if such nuisance is not abated by the owner or person in control of such property within the timeline specifically outlined in the written notice based on time of year and type of tree to be removed in the manner prescribed by the city, by and through its public works department, may enter upon the premises and abate the nuisance.
- B. If the owner or person in control of any private premises upon which such a nuisance exists does not abate or eliminate the same within the timeline specifically outlined in the written notice based on time of year and type of tree to be removed the city of Moorhead, its officers, employees and agents shall proceed to have such nuisance properly abated or eliminated.

6-2B-6: PROHIBITED ACTS:

- A. Transporting Elm Wood. It is unlawful for any person to have or_transport within the City any bark-bearing elm wood_without having obtained a permit from the City. The City shall grant such permits only when the purposes of this Article will be served thereby.
- A. Selling, storing, and transporting infested nuisance wood, as defined in 6-2B-1, is unlawful for any person within the city without having obtained a permit from the Public Works Director, City Forester, or other appropriate designee. A permit shall be granted only when the purposes of this chapter shall not be impaired or adversely effected.
- B. Interference: It is unlawful for any person to prevent, delay or interfere with any authorized City personnel while they are engaged in the performance of duties imposed by this Article.

6-2B-7: PENALTY:

Publication:

Any persons violating Section <u>6-2B-6</u> shall, upon conviction, be penalized in accordance with the provisions of Section <u>1-4-2</u> of this Code. (Ord. 427, 2-10-69)

The Forestry Division of Public Works intends to implement their Emerald Ash Borer Management Plan to contain and slow the spread of the disease. The plan effectively removes smaller, less valuable ash trees and chemically treats those larger than 11" in diameter. This plan is the most cost effective and environmentally conscious way to preserve ash trees in the urban forest and has been successfully utilized in other communities.

To implement the plan, the Forestry Division will incur several costs not included in their 2023 operating budget including; two additional seasonal employees to perform the injections, tree injection kits, the chemical treatment, trees to replace those removed, and possibly contractor assistance with Dutch Elm Disease (DED) removal and/or scheduled pruning if the EAB infestation is more widespread than currently known.

Resolution to Authorize Purchase of a 35-Foot Heavy Duty Diesel BRT-style Transit Bus from New Flyer Industries

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider authorizing the purchase of one replacement 35-Foot Heavy Duty Diesel BRT-style Transit Buses from New Flyer Industries for delivery in 2024. The total cost is not to exceed \$565,000, which includes \$8,000 in contingencies for change orders and payment to sub-vendors for related costs, such as decals and set-up.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

A 2010 New Flyer 35-Foot bus was totaled in an accident in 2020 prior to the end of its useful life. The City of Moorhead applied for and received Federal grant funds to cover 85% of the replacement cost using a combination of Federal Section 5307 and 5339 grant funds and budgeted replacement for delivery in 2021.

There has been a 20% increase in bus prices post-pandemic. The initial New Flyer proposal was \$595,000 per bus, which exceeds the amount budgeted of \$541,000. The Moorhead Transit Manager and Fargo Assistant Director of Fleet and Facilities worked with New Flyer to remove options and amenities on the bus to reduce the price to \$557,000, and to include up to \$8,000 for contingencies and other vendor costs, such as decals and set-up. The total increase in price to \$565,000 is \$24,000 higher than the budgeted cost. Federal 5307 funds apportioned to Moorhead are available to pay for 85% of the increase in cost through a grant amendment.

New Flyer has provided written assurance that one Moorhead bus, along with nine Fargo buses ordered together by March 30, 2023, could be delivered approximately one year from placement of the order, which would be the first guarter of 2024.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The replacement bus was included in the City's approved 2021-2025 Capital Improvement Plan and 2021 Mass Transit Budget. The 15% local share match for the bus with increased price is \$84,751. The remaining Federal interest in the bus due to disposal before its useful life is \$63,283 and must be paid to FTA. Proposed funding for the bus consists of:

The Mass Transit Fund is allocated \$150,000 annually in CIP funds for matching capital grants. The \$3,600 needed for the price increase can be allocated from existing CIP funds in Mass Transit Reserves through an internal budget adjustment.

WHEREAS, in 2020 the City of Moorhead joined a consortium of transit agencies lead by the Duluth Transit Authority to request proposals for transit buses to be purchased over a period of five years; and

WHEREAS, proposals were received and reviewed by the consortium for 35-foot Heavy-Duty Diesel BRT-style Transit Buses from Gillig Corporation, New Flyer Industries, Eldorado and Home Town with award recommended to New Flyer Industries;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Moorhead, Minnesota, they do hereby authorize the Mayor and City Manager, to enter into and execute a purchase agreement with New Flyer Industries for one (1) New Flyer 35-Foot Diesel BRT-style Transit Bus at a total cost not to exceed \$565,000.
