SUBJECT:

Public Hearing Regarding the Request of Terry Lagerquist on behalf of 4101 32 Ave LLC for a Property Tax Exemption for a Project located at 4101 32 Ave S (58.417.0050)

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to conduct a Public Hearing and consider approval of a property tax exemption for 4101 32 Ave LLC for an expansion of their commercial-industrial building located at 4101 32 Ave S (58.417.0050).

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The Moorhead City Council and Moorhead Economic Development Authority find that granting property tax exemptions pursuant to program requirements set forth in policies approved on September 12, 2011, increases the community's long-term economic vitality through the creation of additional housing choice, new jobs, increasing employment opportunities for Moorhead residents and expanding Moorhead's property tax base. Further, that existing business will benefit by increasing total number of businesses in Moorhead, thereby positioning Moorhead as a destination to more customers.

Project: Terry Lagerquist, on behalf of 4101 32 Ave LLC, doing business as TL Industries LLC, has planned a 40-foot by 60-foot expansion to their industrial building which includes 22 foot building height, two large overhead doors, two smaller overhead doors accommodating drive through shop access, and walk in doors.

TL Industries LLC is a reliable and efficient transportation company that specializes in comprehensive dirt hauling services for residential, commercial, and industrial clients during the summer months and snow removal services during the winter months.

Employees: TL Industries will retain their current fulltime employees (currently staffed at 5 fulltime employees) which exceeds the minimum threshold for employees with wages above the minimum wage floor.

Property Valuation: The parcel has an assessed land value of \$161,300 and building value of \$641,200. Existing land and building/improvement value, and any future value, remains taxable during the duration of property tax exemption. Only the new assessed building/improvement value receives the exemption.

Based on the preliminary plans submitted with the application, the City Assessor has estimated that the new assessed building value for the project will be approximately \$300,000.

Exemption Term: The term of the exemption is based upon the *new assessed building value* as determined by the City Assessor following building completion. The estimate found in this communication provides an indication of the scope of the project. The new building value and

jobs retained and/or created post construction should meet the minimum requirements for a 3-year property tax exemption.

Timeline: Construction of the project, if approved, will begin in September 2023 with an estimated completion of January 2024. Whatever construction is completed in 2023 will be assessed January 2, 2024, and become payable in 2025. Therefore, the first year of the proposed exemption would be 2025. In the event that construction is only partially complete on January 2, 2024, the project operator may choose to pay taxes for the partial year and begin the full exemption in 2026.

Zoning: The parcel is located within the "Light Industrial" zoning district. The proposed use is permitted with the zoning district. The final building plans will meet all the requirements of the existing zoning district.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The maximum total benefit to the applicant for this expansion project is estimated at approximately \$14,400 in property tax exemptions using projected new assessed building value (\$300,000) and current tax rate (1.6%) for a period of three (3) years.






Site Plan, Building Floor Plan, and Building Elevation



Resolution to Approve a Property Tax Exemption for 4101 32 Ave LLC for Expansion of Commercial Building located at 4101 32 Ave S (58.417.0050)

WHEREAS, 4101 32 Ave LLC desires to construct an expansion of their commercial building located at 4101 32 Ave S (58.417.0050); and

WHEREAS, the City of Moorhead, pursuant to Minnesota Statute Chapter 469.1732, Subdivision 1, has authority to grant a partial or complete exemption from property taxation of all buildings, structures, fixtures, and improvements used in or necessary to a qualifying business; and

WHEREAS, the City of Moorhead has received a completed application form filed in accordance with applicable City procedures, policy, and guidelines from Terry Lagerquist on behalf of 4101 32 Ave LLC requesting the following tax incentives: exemption from property taxation; and

WHEREAS, the application form filed with the City and all associated documentation are complete and have been reviewed and evaluated by City staff; and

WHEREAS, proper notice to competitors pursuant to Minnesota Statute Chapter 469.1734, Subdivision 7, was published twice in the City's official newspaper on August 3, 2023, and August 10, 2023, respectively; and

WHEREAS, 4101 32 Ave LLC is a qualifying business as defined in Minnesota Statute 469.1734; and

WHEREAS, granting the requested tax incentive is in the best interest of the City of Moorhead to enhance the property tax base and create new jobs.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Moorhead that:

- 1. The City Council of the City of Moorhead hereby finds that granting an exemption from property taxation to 4101 32 Ave LLC is necessary to enable 4101 32 Ave LLC to expand services in the City of Moorhead and is in the best interest of the City of Moorhead.
- 2. The City Council of the City of Moorhead hereby grants the tax incentives contained here subject to the terms and conditions in this resolution, the corresponding Tax Incentive Agreement, and the Laws of Minnesota.
- 3. The City of Moorhead hereby approves the application and grants 4101 32 Ave LLC an exemption from property taxation of new building value according to the following schedule:

New Building Taxable Value	Full Time Equivalent (FTE) Jobs Minimum Created or Retained	Term of Exemption
\$250,000-1,249,999	1-2	3 years
\$1,250,000+	3+	5 years

The new building value will fall within the above chart and the exemption is approved for the category in which is falls. Based on an estimated \$300,000 new assessed building value, the exemption would be for a period of 3 years.

- 4. The Mayor and City Manager are hereby authorized and directed to execute the Tax Incentive Agreement on file by and between the City of Moorhead and 4101 32 Ave LLC.
- 5. The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to certify this grant of exemption from property taxation to the City Assessor and County Assessor contingent upon 4101 32 Ave LLC and the City executing the Tax Incentive Agreement.

SUBJECT:

Resolution to Accept Grant Award for 2022 Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Grant Program (Budget Adjustment #23-037)

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider the resolution to authorize the City Manager to accept the 2022 Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Grant Program award from the Minnesota Department of Public Safety, State Fire Marshal Division.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM) Division administers several preparedness grant programs that are available to jurisdictions, agencies and organizations throughout Minnesota. HMEP grants are used to develop, improve, and implement emergency plans; train hazardous materials (hazmat) emergency responders to respond to accidents and incidents involving hazardous materials, and assist local responders to prepare for hazardous materials emergencies, particularly those involving transportation. The City of Moorhead's Hazardous Materials Team has received funding from this grant program in the past several years. An application was submitted under the 2022 HMEP Grant Program to receive funding for training and planning, and an award notification was recently received. This grant award would assist in funding for hazmat training and planning as follows:

The training and planning will benefit the City of Moorhead Fire Department's Hazmat Team and ultimately our citizens and surrounding communities.

The request for authorization to accept this grant through resolution is consistent with City Policy, and the Mayor and Council possess the legal authority to accept grant awards through resolution under City policy and Minnesota Statutes.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

Previous and following notations provide a breakdown of the grant award for the planning and training:

The Federal share of the grant award (80%) would be \$28,755.00 and the required City match (20%) for a total of \$7,188.75 would come from the City of Moorhead Hazmat Team Budget. The Grant Award was greater than our Grant Request, however, we are not going to request surplus funds.

The proposed budget adjustment #23-037 would establish the appropriate expenditure and revenue accounts for the 2022 HMEP Grant Program award.

WHEREAS, this funding would also assist with the costs associated with receiving 'Propane Response – 101 to Advanced Tactics' Responder Training; and

WHEREAS, recent notification was received that the City of Moorhead Hazardous Materials Team has been awarded a 2022 Hazardous Materials Emergency Preparedness Grant to assist with the aforementioned costs; the Federal share of this grant award is \$28,755.00 (80 percent) and the remaining 20 percent of \$7,188.75 would come from the City of Moorhead Hazardous Materials Team budget;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Moorhead, Minnesota, that they do hereby authorize the acceptance of said grant award and authorize the Mayor and City Manager to enter into said grant agreement and expend these funds within the grant guidelines.

Resolution to Approve Grant from PartnerSHIP 4 Health and Related Agreement for Benches in Southside Regional Park (Budget Adjustment #23-041)

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider a resolution to approve a grant and related Agreement from PartnerSHIP 4 Health for benches in Southside Regional Park.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The City of Moorhead has been awarded a PartnerSHIP 4 Health Community Partnership Award for \$5,453.75 to purchase and install five benches in Southside Regional Park.

Bench locations have been identified in strategic locations along the multi-use trail in the park near the stormwater pond, athletic fields, and the future Inclusive Playground. These benches will help enhance Southside Regional Park and will help make the park and neighborhood more accessible for people of all ages and abilities by providing locations to rest.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The City of Moorhead is required to provide a local match of \$545.38 and shipping costs of \$395.00. The local match will include cost of staff-time and the concrete pads for the benches. The concrete pads and shipping will be funded through the 2023 Park Amenities budget.

Grant: \$5,453.75 Shipping: \$395.00 Match: \$545.38

Budget Adjustment #23-041 is included within the resolution to accept the \$5,453.75 grant. The shipping and local match expenses will be accommodated within the 2023 Parks Amenities Budget.

Resolution to Approve Consent to the Clay County Housing and Redevelopment Authority 2024 Special Benefit Tax

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider consent to a Special Benefit Tax for 2024 that was levied by the Clay County HRA Board of Commissioners. The Clay County HRA Board of Commissioners approved the attached Resolution 06-20-23-1 on June 6, 2023. The tax would be levied in all of Clay County, including the Cities of Moorhead and Barnesville, contingent upon consent of each government entity. The City of Barnesville consented to the tax levy at its city council meeting held on August 14, 2023. The Clay County Commission is reviewing this request and will vote by September.

Levy funding would support programs aimed at ending child homelessness, provide funding for rehabilitation work for low to moderate income homeowners and renters, and enable efforts to compete for state and federal affordable housing resources.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The Clay County Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HRA) has provided the following background:

HRA Authority to Levy

The HRA Tax Levy is not subject to the overall levy limits of the county or any city. Minnesota Statute §469.033, subd. 6 permits HRAs to levy and collect a Special Benefit Tax of up to 0.0185% of taxable market value in its area of operation.

History of Use of HRA Levy in Clay County

Levy funds can be used for any allowable housing authority activity. The HRA has proven to be careful steward of levy funds. Since its creation in 1975, Clay County HRA has exercised their levy five times in Clay County and twice within the City of Moorhead.

Housing studies have found that our region lags behind other areas in the need for affordable housing. The State of Minnesota recently made historic appropriations of over \$2 billion in housing resources. Local funding will support the HRA in competing for these needed resources as most other housing agencies pass local levies on a regular basis. For each \$1 raised in property taxes and local funds, the HRA has been able to generate an additional \$13.65 in funding from outside sources. From the total of \$1,210,000 the HRA has received in local funding, it has leveraged over \$16,515,000 in federal, state and foundation investments. This has included \$4,515,000 for rehabilitation of single-family homes and businesses, over \$7 million for the rehabilitation of rental housing and over \$5,000,000 in additional rental assistance and supports.



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Clay County HRA and Moorhead Public Housing Agency (MPHA) Collaboration

MPHA and Clay County HRA recently merged their staffing and operations to streamline and improve service delivery to low-income households. The collaboration began in March and has been going very well. The Moorhead PHA and Clay HRA operate extensively within Moorhead. The agencies manage or own a combined 295 subsidized housing units and administer over one thousand rental assistance vouchers within the City of Moorhead. The agencies continue to have separate boards, with the MPHA board appointed by the Moorhead Mayor and Council. The MPHA does not have the same ability to impose a levy due to its enabling resolution and the session law that created the agency.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

This proposal has no impact on the City of Moorhead levy limit. The Clay County HRA Board of Commissioners has imposed the levy and is only seeking consent from the City. For the Clay County HRA, the maximum levy available for 2024 is \$1,435,700. The \$500,000 levy request is 35% of the maximum levy available and is equivalent to an estimated tax rate of 0.0647%.

The average amount per household is less than \$20 per year. The impact based on taxable market value is listed as follows:

TMV	Levy Amount

Funding generated from Moorhead properties would be directed to programs within the City of Moorhead. A breakdown of the total proposed use of funds across Clay County is as follows:

\$75,000 – Ending Child Homelessness:

Continue to work towards the goal of ending child homelessness by supporting programs targeted at this population such as Homework Starts with Home and Homeless to Housed. The Moorhead School District is a partner in this grant. In the 10-county region the Moorhead School District had the highest number of children enrolled who identified as homeless during the 2022-2023 school year. 66% of the children enrolled who identified as homeless were enrolled in Moorhead Schools.

\$100,000 – Security Improvements:

Post-pandemic we have seen an increase in acute mental health issues. The increase in behavioral issues is concerning. The safety of our tenants and staff is our top agency priority.

\$75,000 – Capacity to leverage additional resources:

Leverage and support accessing a portion of over \$2 billion in new state housing resources to benefit Clay County residents. Since Moorhead is a CDBG entitlement community, it operates



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its own owner-occupied rehabilitation program. The HRA does operate the Minnesota Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program in Moorhead an has partnered with the city rehabilitation program.

\$150,000 - Other Rehabilitation Activities:

Other rehab activities include collaborating with local communities (Hawley, Barnesville, etc.) to submit applications to MN DEED to obtain funds to rehabilitate homes and businesses.

\$100,000 - Re-roof Agassiz Apartment in Ulen, MN:

This is a subsidized Rural Development apartment building for seniors and those with disabling conditions. Its roof has needed replacement since 2015, but there have been insufficient funds to make this repair.

Whereas, Minnesota Statutes §469.033 subd. 6 permits the Housing and Redevelopment Authority of Clay County to levy and collect a Special Benefit Tax of up to 0.0185% of the taxable market value upon all taxable property, both real and personal, within the Authority's area of operation which includes Clay County, and in the cities of Barnesville and Moorhead; and

Whereas, §469.033 subd. 6 requires the consent of Board of Commissioners of Clay County, and any political subdivision not explicitly in the HRA area of operation to approve such a levy; and

Whereas, Minnesota Statutes require Local Governments to certify to the County Auditor their Tax Levies.

NOW THEREORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE HOUSING AND REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF CLAY COUNTY AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That a Special Benefit Tax, pursuant to Minnesota Statute §469.033 subd. 6, of \$500,000 be levied upon all taxable market value of taxable property within the Authority's area of operation which is all of Clay County and in the cities of Barnesville and Moorhead, upon their consent.
- 2. The levy is approximately 0.006% and does not exceed 0.0185% of taxable market value of the taxable property as defined above.
- That this special levy is for the tax year 2024.
- 4. That this special levy will be used for costs associated with administering and performing rehabilitation work on homes occupied by low and moderate-income owners located in Clay County, Minnesota; administering rental assistance, including the Homework Starts with Home Program and subsidized housing developments in Clay County; and developing new affordable housing opportunities within Clay County.
- That a copy of this resolution along with a formal letter requesting approval of this tax be forwarded to the Board of Commissioners of Clay County and the Moorhead and Barnesville City Councils forthwith for approval.

Resolution to Authorize Budget and Expenditures for Maple Court Townhomes Homeownership Initiative

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to approve the following Maple Court Townhomes Homeownership initiative actions:

- Budget for Maple Court to include the professional services required for future property transfer.
- Approve contract with Houston Engineering for professional services associated with future land transfer.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The City of Moorhead, by and through Maple Court Ownership Development LLC (the "LLC"), a single-member limited liability company created by the City of Moorhead wherein the City of Moorhead is the sole member, acquired 17 units of the Maple Court Townhomes development (1080 17 Ave N, 1618 10 ½ St N, 1622 10 ½ St N) for the purpose of preserving affordable housing and providing homeownership opportunities to eligible tenants. The City of Moorhead contracts with Moorhead Public Housing Agency to manage the units and property and to date the City has received monthly rent net of expenses. Because the acquisition of the property occurred outside the City budget cycle, a formal budget was not established. A 2023 budget that includes expenses to initiate the sale of the properties is included for Council authorization. As the City prepares to sell the City will incur expenses.

The City's 17 units are existing on one land parcel. In order to prepare these units for homeownership, each needs its own individual parcel. A replat is required to accomplish this. which is a professional service that needs to be contracted out. The City of Moorhead entered into a Master Agreement for Professional Services with Houston Engineering, Inc. on February 13, 2023. Houston Engineering submitted a proposal for the professional service of a plat for Maple Court Townhomes.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

Revenues projected for 2023 total \$170,772. Expenses are projected at \$124,110. The remainder will be held in Reserve for unanticipated expenses. Eventual sales proceeds will also be placed in reserve for future budget considerations.

Resolution to Approve Budget Adjustment #23-042 for State of Minnesota One-Time Public Safety Aid Funding

RECOMMENDATION:

The Mayor and City Council are asked to consider the resolution to approve budget adjustment #23-042 for State of Minnesota One-time Public Safety Aid Funding.

BACKGROUND/KEY POINTS:

The 2023 omnibus tax bill included \$210 million in one-time public safety aid that will be distributed to cities across the state. The City of Moorhead's allocation of this aid is \$1,950,913. The City will receive the funds on December 26, 2023. The aid must be used to "provide public safety." The authorizing language in the law provides categories of eligible spending, but the list is not exhaustive. The allowable uses named in the new law include Community violence prevention, community intervention programs, community engagement, mental health crisis responses, victim services, training programs, first responder wellness, equipment related to fires, rescue, and emergency services and other personnel or equipment costs.

In response to the increasingly competitive market for Police Officer candidates, and in conjunction with the State of Minnesota One-Time Public Safety Aid, the City of Moorhead will be implementing the Police Officer Referral Incentive and Police Officer Recruitment Incentive programs. The proposed budget adjustment will utilize a portion of the public safety aid for these programs in 2023. The remaining amount of public safety aid will be incorporated into future year budgets.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS:

The proposed budget adjustment will establish the appropriate revenue and expenditure accounts for the One-Time Public Safety Aid funding.
