CITY INSIGHTS MOORHEAD MINNESOTA

RIVER CORRIDOR STUDY

After significant floods in 2009, 2010, and 2011, the City of Moorhead began several flood mitigation projects and acquisition of flood-prone properties adjacent to the river. As a result, a large portion of private property along the Red River has been transferred to public ownership for flood risk reduction.

The River Corridor Study was implemented to answer questions about the use of this public land and to develop a plan to guide future management and maintenance of the river corridor balancing community needs, flood mitigation, transportation, recreation, public/private property, and natural resource preservation and restoration.

The Study will define how the public land in the river corridor will be used, what it will look like, and how it will be managed, and it will:

- Address flood mitigation strategies
- Identify a continuous river trail and pedestrian bridge locations
- Define activities and concepts at recreation sites
- Recommend interpretive themes and strategies
- Guide natural resource stewardship and restoration
- Propose policy for lease/sale of public lands along the river corridor
- Outline strategies for the delineation of public and private land
- Guide implementation: priorities and phasing, capital and operational budgets, funding and partnership opportunities

There are two phases to the River Corridor Study. Phase I, led by Metro COG, was completed in April 2013 and identified the needs and issues related to the River Corridor as well as documented existing conditions, summarized public input, outlined limitations along the River Corridor, and presented a range of needs and opportunities identified by the public, residents, and staff. Phase II of the study is nearing completion and will result in a Final River Corridor Plan which will establish a set of policy and strategy alternatives that can be used to address the issues, needs, and opportunities identified along the River Corridor.

CITY ELECTIONS WHAT HAS CHANGED?

On November 5, 2013 the voters of the City of Moorhead voted to amend the Moorhead City Charter to change the City's municipal elections from odd to even year elections by 57 percent. The Moorhead City Council discussed the change in January 2014 in order to pass an orderly transition ordinance to regulate the terms of current City Council members affected by the change from odd to even years. City Council decided to follow State Statute. Therefore, by default the next City Election will be held in 2016. Below is the adjusted list of the City Council's current term end dates:

The average cost of an odd-year city election is \$16,172, or \$3.94 per voter. In comparison to the new ordinance passed, an even-year, federal/state election costs the city \$27,552, but only \$1.61 per voter. Thrifty Watts[®] is a residential load management and energy conservation program offered by Moorhead Public Service (MPS). Thrifty Watts[®] allows MPS to cycle your central air conditioner, or both your central air conditioner and electric water heater, on and off during periods of high electric usage in return for a credit applied to your monthly utility bill.

There is **NO COST TO YOU** nor do you need to supply or purchase any special equipment.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE FOR THIS PROGRAM?

MPS' residential electric customers are eligible for Thrifty Watts®; however, dual-fuel customers already have these savings available to them through the Dual-Fuel Program, so dual-fuel customers are not eligible to participate in Thrifty Watts®.

WHAT ARE THE ADVANTAGES?

- By cycling the air conditioner you should notice very little, if any, change in your comfort level, but you will feel good about the credit applied to your monthly utility bill from MPS.
- MPS will credit your utility bill \$9/month during the summer months of June, July, and August for allowing MPS to cycle your central air conditioner.
- Receive an additional credit of \$3/month year-round by allowing MPS to also control your electric water heater.
- You will know that you are playing a significant role in helping MPS reduce the amount of higher-cost power purchased during peak electric usage periods.

FLOOD INFORMATION

FLOOD INSURANCE

Any Moorhead resident can buy flood insurance. FEMA's Biggert-Waters Flood Insurance Reform Act of 2012 took effect on July 6, 2012. Key provisions of the legislation require that flood insurance premiums be raised to reflect true flood risk. The changes will result in premium rate increases for some, but not all, policyholders in the SFHA (Special Flood Hazard Area or 100-year floodplain).

WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

The new law eliminates subsidized rates and discounts previously available to certain properties resulting in increased flood insurance rates on subsidized policies in the SFHA. The full risk rate for a property is determined by an elevation certificate. Buying or selling a property, or allowing a policy to lapse, can trigger a rate change. Homeowners and business owners are encouraged to learn more about their flood risk and talk with their insurance agent on how these changes may affect their property and flood insurance policy. Owners of primary residences can keep their subsidized rates as long as they own the property, but full-risk rates will apply for the next owner.

FLOOD MITIGATION PROJECT ACCREDITATION

Over the next two years, the City will be working to achieve FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) accreditation for flood mitigation improvements constructed subsequent to the 2009 flood of record.

Projects proposed for accreditation are those that affect the largest number of floodplain properties and meet FEMA's technical criteria. To meet FEMA's criteria, the City will need to complete construction of levee (or floodwall) projects, and complete construction of several stormwater improvements that will ensure that snowmelt and precipitation do not cause flooding on the "dryside" of levees. The City has requested State funding to complete this work.

Provided that funding is available, the City will construct the necessary improvements in 2014. Upon completion, the City will submit accreditation applications to FEMA for specific areas within the City. If successful, flood insurance requirements for most, if not all, properties in the current SFHA (Special Flood Hazard Area) will be removed.

PROPERTY INFORMATION

Lenders, insurance agents, realtors, and citizens can call **218.299.5387** and speak with the City's Certified Floodplain Manager to obtain information on whether a property is or is not within the SFHA. Information is also available on the City's website. The Engineering Department maintains on file the Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs), Letter of Map Change, and other flood related information.

ELEVATION CERTIFICATE

Elevation certificates are available for some properties within the City. If the City does not have an elevation certificate on file, the services of an engineering consultant will be needed.

FLOOD SAFETY

- If your home is about to be flooded, contact Moorhead Public Service at 218.299.5400 (after hours 218.299.5418) to have your power turned off and the City of Moorhead at 218.299.5386 to inform staff that the sewer has been plugged.
- Be alert for gas leaks—if you smell gas, report it to Xcel Energy at 1.800.895.2999.

EMERGENCY PREPARATION

Being prepared for a flood will not only help keep your family safe, but also will help minimize potential flood damage and accelerate recovery efforts. In addition to purchasing flood insurance and understanding its policy, you can protect your family by safeguarding your home and possessions and developing a family disaster plan.

TIPS AND REMINDERS:

- Please separate trash, appliances, and tires; no more than two appliances per household.
- Do not include computer monitors, television sets, lumber, concrete, building materials, batteries, paint, hazardous chemicals, oil, or anti-freeze—there will be a disposal fee for these items.
- Trash placed at the curb BEFORE the start of Clean-UP Week will be collected and billed as a special pick-up at a \$15 minimum charge.

HOMFOWNER'S TIPS FOR TREE CARE

- Watering is the most important thing to keep newly . planted trees alive.
- 1 gallon of water for a 1 inch diameter tree is needed . for every day it doesn't rain in hot summer months.
- Trees also need to be watered throughout their second ٠ growing season.
- Use a 2-inch thick layer of wood mulch around the new tree. However, do not stack the mulch against the trunk.
