RE: 1997 Moorhead Fire & Rescue Annual Report

There were 1,949 emergency run responses in 1997, as compared to 1,893 in 1996, which is an increase of approximately 3%. The increases over the last five years are as follows:

The total fire loss for 1997 was \$183,430.00, which is a decrease of approximately 30.3% compared with the total fire loss of \$262,765.00 in 1996. Fire losses over the last five years are as follows:

The emergency medical and rescue call responses for 1997 totaled 1,182, which is approximately 60.6% of the total emergency responses for the Moorhead Fire & Rescue Department. These figures correspond to the national statistics of medical responses. These figures show the need for this service and the City's dedication to the elderly and health care. The citizens of Moorhead continually show their desire for and support of this service. This is made possible by the commitment and expertise of the Firefighters who respond to medical emergency responses.

Listed below are some of the changes/events that took place in our department in 1997:

JANUARY:

Lieutenant Daryl Hendricksen was promoted to Assistant Chief on C Shift.

Firefighter Joe Gaughan was promoted to the Lieutenant position on B Shift.

Firefighter Todd Erickson was appointed Assistant Fire Marshal.

Andy Garding began his career as a Firefighter for the Moorhead Fire & Rescue Department.

Firefighters spent almost six hours a day clearing and re-clearing fire hydrants due to snow storms.

Five Firefighters were awarded excellent rating through the Physical Fitness Training Program.

FEBRUARY:

Don Sakry, Plumbing/Mechanical and Building Inspector, was chosen as February's Pride of Moorhead Winner.

Firefighters, along with Police and Ambulance personnel, attended a "critical incident stress debriefing" (CISD), after a medical response to a homicide of an infant.

MARCH:

Assistant Chief Don Johnson was chosen as March's Pride of Moorhead winner.

APRIL:

Firefighter Jeff Wallin was the April Pride of Moorhead winner.

Following the record snowfall of approximately 120 inches, came the record flood. Everyone was affected in one way or another. Countless volunteers from surrounding communities came to assist homeowners in the battle to save their homes. Besides carrying out their many other duties and responsibilities, the Fire Department constructed sand bag fillers, filled sand bags and assisted other departments and citizens with boats and equipment. The office staff was busy with more paper work and bombarded with questions that ranged from where citizens could obtain sand bags or other assistance to flood related clean-up questions.

Some surrounding communities were hit very hard and lost many homes. Towns such as Ada, Breckenridge and East Grand Forks/Grand Forks were some of these. The Fargo-Moorhead area was very fortunate in comparison to these towns.

The flood was a learning experience. It taught many of us that Mother Nature is very powerful and deserves respect. It also taught us that there was a strong sense of community spirit that was wide spread.

MAY:

Lieutenant Clay Dietrich attended the "Command and Control of Fire Department Major Operations at Multi-Alarm Incidents" course through the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg, Maryland.

JUNE:

Lieutenant Clay Dietrich was chosen as July's Pride of Moorhead winner.

The City of Moorhead and Moorhead Fire & Rescue signed the final contract with the State of Minnesota to become the Northwest Regional HazMat Team.

JULY:

The Fire Department started using the Firehouse software. This computer program replaced the NFIRS system. All run reports are entered into this program and submitted to the State of Minnesota on a monthly basis. Thanks to Firefighter Jeff Wallin for installing the software.

AUGUST:

The State Hazardous Material van was delivered to the Moorhead Fire & Rescue Department.

SEPTEMBER:

Firefighter/Acting Officer Mike Saulsbury was chosen as September's Pride of Moorhead winner.

Dwayne Tollefson began his career as Firefighter for the Moorhead Fire & Rescue Department.

OCTOBER:

Deputy Chief Marty Soeth received a Congressional Fire Service Institute award for his 35 years of service with the Moorhead Fire & Rescue Department. Presenting the award was Linda Westrom from the office of Senator Rod Grams, who was the sponsoring member in Congress.

The Fifth Annual Moorhead Fire & Rescue Department Open House for MDA was held on October 5, 1997. The event kicked off the Fire Prevention Week which was October 5-11, 1997. The Open House gives citizens of all ages a chance to see the fire engines and equipment, fire fighting equipment demonstrations, and aerial rides were available to the public. There is also a poster contest for all second grade students in Moorhead. (The posters must contain a fire safety related message). All posters were displayed in the Main Fire Station during the Open House. Everyone attending the event had an enjoyable time.

NOVEMBER:

Amy Weigel, Office Specialist, was selected as the November Pride of Moorhead winner.

Lieutenant Clay Dietrich attended the "Hazardous Materials Incident Management" course through the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg, Maryland.

DECEMBER:

Firefighter Jerry Shawstad retired after 27 years with the City of Moorhead. Jerry was always ready to lend a helping hand. His talents as a mechanic, as well as his thoughtful ways, will be missed by the Moorhead Fire & Rescue Department.

Lieutenant Lyle Gernand attended the "Hazardous Materials Incident Management" course through the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg, Maryland.

We had a <u>very</u> busy year in 1997, and I feel a very special thanks must go to the Firefighters and Officers of the Moorhead Fire & Rescue, and also to all the employees of the Fire Administration Office. RE: 1997 Suppression Annual Report

I have compiled a report reflecting the duties performed by the Suppression Division. In addition to responding to alarms, Suppression includes training and other services performed by Fire & Rescue personnel.

Continued training is essential to the Moorhead Fire & Rescue Department. In 1997, the department trained in houses provided by Moorhead State University. Training included fire rescue, foam application, exposure protection and various pumping applications.

In 1997, there was a total of 1,949 emergency calls; of this number, 1,182 were emergency medical responses.

Hazardous Materials training for our Regional HazMat Team has occupied a great deal of training time in the past year. A one ton van was purchased with State money and owned by the City. The van is equipped for HazMat responses and was put in service in the Fall of 1997.

The maintenance of equipment and facilities is extremely important to our department as reflected in our activity report. The Suppression Division's breakdown of activity hours for 1997 is found on the following page.

RENTAL REGISTRATION INSPECTION PROGRAM

The Rental Registration/Inspection Program was initiated in July of 1986. Since its inception the Rental Housing Program has moved forward to address the problems listed as critical neighborhood issues by the citizen task force groups. I feel the program has met or improved many of the issues which are listed below:

--Deterioration of housing

--Parking problems

--Absentee Landlords

--Overcrowding of rental property

There are currently 957 properties registered as rental with a total of 4,604 individual units. In 1997, there were 1,509 housing inspections made. There were 2,631 written housing violations with 1,853 of these violations being fully corrected.

Although the total number of inspection made in 1997 decreased by 4% from 1996, the number of written violations increased by 36% and the number of corrections increased by 27.3%. These figures indicate increased enforcement and compliance with housing codes.

The Rental Housing Department is working hard to achieve its long term goal of inspecting all rental property every two years. In 1997 a concentrated effort has been made to identify those properties in most need of an inspection.

I believe these statistics reveal the effectiveness of the Rental Registration/Inspection Program. This program is doing the job it was designed for--systematic inspection of rental property, addressing life safety and other housing violations, and obtaining corrections of the noted violations.

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RE: Environmental Health Annual Report for 1997

The Environmental Health Division inspects all food/beverage/lodging, trailer courts, swimming pools, and vending machines. This Division also takes care of nuisance complaints and does plan review for new construction and remodeling of food/ beverage/lodging establishments. The Environmental Health Division has a delegation agreement with both the Minnesota Department of Health and Department of Agriculture regarding environmental affairs.

Classes are given upon request. Materials cover areas such as food sanitation and food manager training. The Moorhead's Mandatory Food Service Training Program, which was initiated in the mid 1970's, has become extremely popular. Presently, the State of Minnesota is incorporating the Mandatory Food Service Training Program in the new upcoming ordinance. When this becomes an ordinance, the local mandatory certification would have fulfilled it's primary function and will no longer be utilized.

The Citizen Action Requests, which are basically nuisance complaints we receive, have decreased. The nuisance complaints consist of junk vehicles, some communicable diseases, junk/debris, indoor/outdoor air problems, disposal of pesticides, oil spills, etc. Some of these complaints also occur in mobile home parks. It has been noted there have been marked improvements regarding nuisance conditions in mobile home parks. Also, presently there are two consulting firms that deal with indoor air problems. We use these



firms as referrals. We do have limited information regarding indoor air problems such as mold, radon, etc. However, this information is provided upon request. Some outdoor air problems can be referred to the Pollution

Control Agency. Oil spills or complaints of that nature are also referred to that agency.

There were 87 Citizen Action Requests this year - two were referred to the Pollution Control Agency, five were abated by the City, ten were referred to the office of the City Attorney where an estimated \$800.00 was collected in fines. Of the 404 nuisance inspections, some were incorporated with the inspection of mobile home courts.

The vending machines have increased since the program was initiated; in 1989, there were 62 machines and in 1997, there were 126.

Some of the positive changes in 1997, were:

- (1) The overall improvement of the conditions of the mobile home parks.
- (2) The enforcement/fee collections from the prosecutor's office.

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THE DEPARTMENT

The Moorhead Codes Office, which is located in the Main Fire Station Annex, is staffed by a Building Official, a Plumbing/Heating/Building Inspector, a half-time Building Inspector, and an Office Specialist.

The principal responsibilities of the Codes Office are the enforcement of the various laws and ordinances enacted by the City and the State. These include:

State Building Code - 1994 Uniform Building Code State Mechanical Code - 1991 Uniform Mechanical Code State Plumbing Code State Handicapped Code - ANSI A117.1 State Energy Code State Floodproofing Code State Floodproofing Code State Architectural Registration Laws City Zoning Ordinance and other related City Ordinances Contractor Licensing - City and State

Enforcement of these codes generally consists of review of proposed work to establish compliance with laws and ordinances, issuance of permits, and inspection of the work to insure compliance.

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In addition, the Codes Office also supervises the collection of a wide variety of fees such as sewer hookup and gas hookup fees and administers compliance with agreements entered into between the city and developers and homeowners such as easements, bike paths, sewer hookup lists, and covenants.

Enforcement of the Zoning Ordinance occupies a significant amount of staff time with Board of Adjustment activities, complaint investigations, ordinance reviews, inquires from the public, and public meetings heading the list.

Staff members are also involved in a wide variety of other projects that include the preparation of a myriad of reports, public education, handling of complaints and inquiries, attending various meetings, reviewing and recommending changes in city ordinances, staff education, and providing information for other city departments and the public. Providing information to the public involves not only answering questions and providing handouts in the Codes Office but attending public meetings, Chamber of Commerce meetings, classes at local colleges, and teaching contractor licensing classes.

THE YEAR 1997

The 620 building permits issued in 1997 was an increase of 12 percent over the number issued in 1996. The 1,649 total permits issued was a slight reduction over the previous year.

New home construction dropped to 52 units from the 77 constructed in 1996. The total value of new single family residential construction was \$5.9 million.

Commercial construction was also down in 1997. Valuation for the year totaled \$9.5 million which compared to \$14.5 million in 1996. Residential remodeling, with permits valued at \$4.1 million, was the bright spot showing a 78% increase.

INCOME

Total revenues were \$126,000 with building permit fees (\$75,175) accounting for 59% of all revenue collected.

PERSONNEL STATUS

Don Sakry started his eighth year as Building/Plumbing/Heating Inspector. Don also assists with plan review, permit issuance, and answering code questions. Don attended the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials Annual Conference in Phoenix, Arizona, in September.

Gail Nelson completed ten years of service to the City of Moorhead in 1997 as an Office Specialist. In addition to clerical duties, Gail prepares more than 40 technical reports each year, supervises contractor licensing, issues nearly 1500 permits, and directs inspection calls. In addition Gail is receiving on the job training to allow her to assume a more technical role.

Kurt Wenzel started his fifth year in the Codes Office. Kurt has quickly picked up our system and has been a valuable addition to our staff. Kurt also makes all of the Housing Rehab inspections.

Rick Davidson completed ten years of service in 1997 as Building Official and Zoning Administrator. Rick is also active in the Northwest Minnesota Chapter of Building Officials serving on the legislative committee and was sponsored to attend the CABO code change hearings in San Diego in October to argue various code change proposals.

SUMMARY

1997 was a very good construction year in the City of Moorhead with totals being just below the five year average. Staff members continued their goal to provide fast and efficient service. This goal has been realized as complaints continue at extremely low levels and positive public comments are frequent. This is important to note because our office has more than 10,000 public contacts in an average year.

With new home and commercial construction expected to rise in 1998, the Moorhead construction economy appears healthy.
